Sports Continue With Transgender Inclusion

Major sports bodies will continue to work on transgender inclusion guidelines, despite the agreement between National and New Zealand First which aims to remove transgender women from women's sport. The coalition agreement states the new government would "ensure publicly funded sporting bodies support fair competition that is not compromised by rules relating to gender". The coalition agreement statement about sport was led by New Zealand First. It was a topic the party campaigned on during the election. However, a policy or timeline has yet to be established, New Zealand First's sports spokesperson Andy Foster said, but he hopes it will occur in time for the next sports funding round next year.

Canada's First Sport Integrity Commissioner To Resign In Early 2024 December 19, 2023

Sarah-Eve Pelletier, who as Canada's first sport integrity commissioner headed the office that handled complaints about alleged abuse in sport, will resign in early 2024, it was announced on Tuesday. The former artistic swimmer's decision to resign follows the launch and first 18 operational months of Abuse-Free Sport, Canada's first-ever independent safe sport program. Pelletier was appointed to the role in April 2022 after calls from athletes across the country for more to be done to address abuse and harassment in sports.

The Honourable Union Minister, Ministry of Earth Sciences (MoES), Sh Kiren Rijiju, flagged off India's first winter scientific expedition to the Arctic from the MoES headquarters in New Delhi on December 18, 2023. Indian scientific expeditions to the Arctic during the winter (November to March) will allow researchers to conduct unique scientific observations during polar nights, where

there is no sunlight for nearly 24 hours and sub-zero temperatures (as low as -15 degrees Celsius.

Back in 1968, US Senator Robert Kennedy quipped that GDP measures "neither our wisdom nor our learning — it measures everything, in short, except that which makes life worthwhile".

Just as GDP can measure economic growth and prosperity but not well-being or progress towards sustainable development, so too the volume of scientific publications is a measure of quantity, not quality.

The limits of the "public or perish" mantra were underscored in 2015, when Tu Youyou was awarded the Nobel Prize "for her discoveries concerning a

novel therapy against malaria" that she had developed in a Chinese laboratory 40 years earlier.
