FOREWORD

St. Berchmans College was established in 1922 by the Archdiocese of Changanassery as an Intermediate college affiliated to the University of Madras. Since its inception the college has been trying to provide high-quality, value-based education to its students by inculcating in them strength of character and love and service of fellow human beings on the one hand and by helping them achieve excellence in their respective areas of study and other activities, on the other. Over these 102 years, it has grown up gradually and steadily, initiating Undergraduate programmes in 1927, Postgraduate programmes in 1957 and Research programmes in 1986. The College is aided by the Government of Kerala and is affiliated to the Mahatma Gandhi University, Kottayam, Kerala. The College is recognized under section 2 (f) and section 12B of the UGC Act 1956.

The College was first accredited by NAAC with ‘Five Star’ in 1999 and was reaccredited with ‘A+’ in 2006 in the second cycle. It underwent the third round of NAAC accreditation in 2012 and was graded ‘A’, the highest grade at that time. The commitment of the college to quality enhancement is evident in the accreditation and assessment grades it has received earlier. The College was again assessed and accredited with an ‘A’ Grade in the fourth cycle of NAAC accreditation in 2017. In the fifth cycle of NAAC accreditation in 2023, it was graded ‘A+’. It is ranked 54th in the ranking conducted by the National Institutional Ranking Framework (NIRF) 2023, released by the Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India.

The pursuit of excellence by St. Berchmans College is evidenced by its winning the prestigious R. Sankar Award instituted by the Government of Kerala for the best special grade aided college in the state in 1996 and 1997. In 2004, the UGC identified St. Berchmans as a College with Potential for Excellence. DST extended its support through the FIST scheme to the Physics and Chemistry Departments in 2005 and 2006, respectively. It was recognized as a Partner Institute of IGNOU in 2008. In 2012, DST expanded its FIST support to all the Science Departments. In 2014, the College became autonomous. The autonomous status gives the college the freedom to frame academic programs, syllabi, methods of assessment, conduct examinations, and publish results. The degree will be awarded by the affiliating University. Recently, the Department of Biotechnology, Government of India, also extended its support in the form of the DBT-STAR college scheme.

The College offers 16 UG and 20 PG programmes. There are 10 Research Departments offering Doctoral programs. It is a co-educational institution. The College keeps itself in the forefront of higher education in the country by appointing men and women of excellence in academics and character as teachers, by providing state-of-the-art infrastructure facilities, and by maintaining a calm and peaceful atmosphere indispensable for academic work. A fully automated library with more than 1 lakh titles, 220 journals, and 465 magazines, and the digital library with access to the online database PROWESS, are the backbone of our learning facilities. The digital library has subscribed to INFLIBNET, DELNET, and EBSCO Host, offering a large volume of e-journals and e-books. The college is also a CERTIPORT Authorized Testing Center of Microsoft.

1. INTRODUCTION

St. Berchmans College has successfully completed eight years in the autonomous system. Admissions to various programmes are done by the College itself. The candidates have to register online for admission to various postgraduate (PG) programmes. Candidates can apply for a maximum of three programmes provided they satisfy the eligibility conditions of the respective programmes. Candidates are requested to read the prospectus carefully before registering online.

2. IMPORTANT INFORMATION

- All candidates who wish to apply for PG Programmes for the academic year 2025- 26 irrespective of category shall register online
- Visit www.sbcollege.ac.in for online registration
- Candidates shall register online on or before the last date specified in the admission schedule
- The candidate will receive a username and password upon registration
- The registration fee is ₹400/- for candidates other than SC/ST/OEC and ₹200/- for SC/ST/OEC candidates
- The application fee for management quota is ₹100/-. Candidates who wish to be considered for management quota seats shall tick the respective check box during registration
- Candidates who wish to be considered in management quota shall submit the filled in management quota application form and the related documents in the admission portal as a single pdf file.
- The registration fee can be remitted through debit/credit cards, net banking, or through UPI.
- Category (SC/ST or others) selected during registration cannot be altered in any further stage of the registration process
- Preference means the candidate's choice of programme
- SF means self-financing programme
- Candidates shall verify his/her personal as well as academic details carefully before final submission
- Any erroneous data shall be corrected on or before the closing date of online registration
- The print out of the application form can be taken only after the closing date of online registration
- Candidates claiming reservation under sports quota, cultural quota, persons with disability and transgender category shall register online and upload the relevant documents while registering
- The candidates shall not send any hard copies to the college
- The rank list will be published in the college website on the date mentioned in the admission schedule
- Selected candidates shall report to the college with all the relevant documents on the date mentioned in the admission schedule
- All communications pertaining to admission will be communicated through SMS only.
- The confirmation of admission shall be strictly based on the verification of original documents on a date prescribed by the College.

5. CLASSIFICATION OF SEATS

The seats are classified as (i) Merit seats, (ii) Reservation seats, (iii) Community seats and (iv) Management seats.

5.1 Seat Distribution

The seats in each programme are distributed according to the rules and regulations put forward by the Government of Kerala and Mahatma Gandhi University. The seat distribution in aided programmes is given in the table.

In Self-financing programmes, 50% of the total seats will be filled by the management from the registered candidates who satisfy the eligibility conditions. The remaining seats (50%) will be filled as detailed below:

6. TYPES OF RESERVATION

The reservation seats for various PG Programmes are set aside for different categories under the following main items.

1. Reservation for International Students
2. Reservation for Nominees
3. Reservation for Persons with Disability
4. Reservation of Seats for Malayalee students from Andaman & Nicobar Islands
5. Transgender Candidates
6. Special Reservation (cultural and sports quota)
7. Mandatory Reservation

6.1 Reservation for International Students

Ten percent (10%) of seats over and above the sanctioned strength is reserved for international students. The students who seek admission in this category shall apply online.

6.2 Reservation for Nominees

An additional seat for each programme is reserved for candidates sponsored by the Union Territory



of Lakshadweep. The candidates shall apply directly to the college.

6.3 Reservation for Persons with Disability

Five percent (5%) of the seats over and above sanctioned strength in each programme is reserved for candidates with disabilities. The selection of candidates under this category will be based on the rank in the merit list and physical suitability and not on the basis of the degree of disability.

As per Clause 2(t), Chapter I of the Persons with Disabilities Act 1995, “person with disability” means a person suffering from not less than 40% of any disability as certified by a Medical Board constituted for this purpose. Candidates who have a minimum of 40% disability alone will be eligible for this quota. A relaxation of 5% marks in the qualifying examination from the prescribed minimum is allowed.

Candidates seeking admission under **Persons with Disability category** shall upload a copy of the ‘Certificate of Disability’ issued by a District Medical Board or bodies of higher status, certifying the degree or percentage of disability. The Permanent Disability Card issued by the State Government is also considered. The original certificate must be produced at the time of admission.

No reservation of seats is allowed for blind candidates for programmes, which come under the faculty of Science

6.4 Reservation of Seats for Malayalee students from Andaman & Nicobar Islands

One additional seat in each programme is reserved for Malayalee students from Andaman & Nicobar Islands. (U.O. No. 6199/A1/2016/Acad dated 23.11.2016)

6.5 Transgender Candidates

Two additional seats in each programme are reserved for transgender candidates as per UO No. 2532/AC A 1/2019/MGU dated 10.06.2019.

6.6 Special Reservation

The seats reserved under Sports Quota and Cultural Quota come under this category.

An additional one seat is earmarked in PG programmes over and above the sanctioned strength for admitting candidates under Sports / Cultural Quota on rotation basis, as per Order no. 3084/A1/2017/Academic dated 24.05.2017.

As per university order no.1038/ACA 1/2022/MGU dated 01.02.2022, If there are no eligible candidates for the seat reserved in Arts/Sports category in any year, it will be transferred to the next category and this reservation should be reversed in the next year. In case of unoccupancy of seats, it will be interchanged.

6.6.1 Reservation of seats under sports quota

- The selection of candidates under the category will be based on the proficiency in sports/games.
- The applicant for admission to the Sports quota should have represented **at least the College in the Inter Collegiate Competitions**. Preference shall be given to Sportsmen who have represented the State/University over the sportsmen who have represented the District/College. Performance in any year during the Under Graduate Programme only will



be taken into consideration.

- Upper age limit for applying through Sports quota is **25 years**.
- The applicant shall produce the Certificate from the Honorary Secretary of the State Association of the event concerned to prove District representation.
- The students admitted in Sports quota shall mandatorily be available to represent the University in the Inter University competitions unless specifically exempted by the Vice-Chancellor/Director of Physical Education, Mahatma Gandhi University.
- Only the events which are having Intercollegiate competitions in Mahatma Gandhi University alone will be considered for Sports Quota admissions.
- Approved World competitions means the competitions organized by the International Apex Bodies of the concerned discipline and in which the national Teams are sponsored by the National Apex Bodies and cleared by Sports Authority of India/ Government of India.
- The National Championship means the championships conducted by the National Apex Bodies of the concerned discipline. District Competition means revenue district competition conducted by district association in respective sports.
- Individual games /event means a game/event in which individual performs alone.
- When a candidates has number of achievement in a sports /different discipline his/ her best achievement will be taken in to consideration.

The following norms are followed for admission under sports quota.

- One seat for every 20 seats for MA, MSc, MCom programmes with permission for interchangeability
- Where the number of seats is less than 20 for a subject, the seats may be pooled together, MA, MSc and M.Com being treated separately. Where the number of seats, after pooling, exceeds multiples of 20, an additional seat can be allocated, if the excess number is 15 or more.
- Where the number of seats is still less than 15 after such pooling, all PG programmes may be pooled together.
- After such pooling, if the number of seats exceeds multiples of 20, an additional seat can be allocated if the excess number is 15 or more.
- A minimum of one seat may be given if there are no sufficient seats.

The following guidelines shall be followed in determining merit in sports and athletics for admission to the PG programmes.

Points shall be awarded to the First (Winner or the Winning Team), Second (Runners up or Runners up team), Third (third place) and participation as:

Resolving of Tie:

If the points of more candidates happen to be the same, then for breaking the 'tie', the following criteria shall be followed one after another in the order given below:

- A person can score points only in one category.
- The highest score will be counted
- Where bracketed, scores in other categories will be counted
- Where still bracketed, Priority will be given in the order of merit i.e.; 1st, 2nd , and 3rd place respectively.
- Those with a more number of achievements in the same level will be placed above the others (more number of 1st places, more number of 2nd places and so on).
- Individual achievements will be ranked above team achievements.
- A new record is created; he/she will be given priority.

If the tie could not be resolved by any of the above mentioned sports achievements, the index



marks based on the qualifying examination shall be considered for breaking the tie.

If vacancies arise due to discontinuation of candidates under Sports quota, the next eligible candidate in the Rank List shall be admitted. No candidates under any circumstances shall be allowed to apply after the last date specified for the sports quota admissions as the seats are deducted from general merit quota seats.

6.6.2 Reservation of seats under cultural quota

The following norms are recommended for admission under cultural quota.

1. One seat for every 20 seats for MA, MSc, M Com Programmes
2. Where the number of seats is less than 20 for a subject, the seats may be pooled together, MA, MSc, and M Com being treated separately. Where the number of seats, after pooling, exceeds multiples of 20, an additional seat can be allocated, if the excess number is 15 or more.
3. Where the number of seats is still less than 15 after such pooling, all PG programmes may be pooled together.
4. After such pooling, if the number of seats exceeds multiples of 20, an additional seat can be allocated if the excess number is 15 or more.
5. A minimum of one seat may be given if there are no sufficient seats.

In the absence of applicants who secure 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th places candidates with 'A' grade shall be considered for admission.

- i. A candidate can score points only in one category
- ii. The highest score will be counted
- iii. Where bracketed, scores in other categories will be counted
- iv. Performance in any year during the Degree programme in Mahatma Gandhi University will be taken into consideration
- v. He/ She must be available for University events unless specifically exempted by the Vice-Chancellor/Director of Physical Education, Mahatma Gandhi University



An equal number of seats of the candidates admitted in sports quota and cultural quota shall be deducted from Open Merit.

6.7 Mandatory Reservation

Claims for mandatory reservation and certificates to be produced

- Claims for Mandatory Reservations must be made by a candidate at the time of registration.
- The claims for mandatory reservation once made in the application form cannot be altered by the candidate under any circumstances.

6.7.1 Claim for reservation under Kerala Scheduled Castes/Kerala Scheduled Tribes quota

Candidates claiming reservation under Kerala Scheduled Castes/Kerala Scheduled Tribes Quota should obtain caste/community certificate from the revenue authorities concerned. The names of castes and communities are given in Annexure I & II.

The seats unavailed by the SC candidates will go to ST candidates and vice versa. The unavailed seats reserved for SC/ST shall be re-notified twice through print media for filling up vacant seats of SC/ST candidates. If such seats are remaining vacant even after re-notification, these shall be filled as detailed below:

*The unfilled seats shall be filled from the rank list of candidates belonging to the same minority community. If seats remain vacant, they shall be filled up from candidates belonging to OEC and in their absence, candidates belonging to SEBC. The seats that further remain unfilled will go to the Open Merit. (*Letter No. B3/168/2019/Hedn dated 20.06.2019)

6.7.2 Claim of OEC candidates against the unavailed seats of SC/ST candidates

Other Eligible Community (OEC) candidates who claim allotment to the un-availed seats, if any, under SC/ST quota should furnish community and income certificates/ non-creamy layer certificate obtained from the Village Officer concerned. Those OEC candidates whose annual family income is up to 8 lakhs (Rupees eight lakhs only) alone are eligible for such seats.

6.7.3 Claim for communal reservation under 'Kerala Socially and Educationally Backward Classes' (KSEBC)

Candidates belonging to Socially and Educationally Backward Classes as per G.O. (P) 02/2019/BCDD dated 08.03.2019, who belong to the non-creamy layer are eligible for reservation under this category. The non-creamy layer certificate should have been issued not earlier than 12



months prior to the submission of application. Only the claims of the candidates of those communities that are included in the list of communities appended in the prospectus will be considered.

Candidates belonging to Ezhava, Muslim, Other backward Hindus, Latin Catholic other than Anglo Indians and Other backward Christian communities, claiming reservation under SEBC Quota should invariably produce both '*Community*' and '*Income Certificates/non-creamy layer certificate*' obtained from the Village Officer concerned. The self-attested copy of the above certificates should be attached with the application. Candidates who belong to the non-creamy layer are eligible for reservation. The seats unavailed by SEBC category candidates will be allotted under open quota

6.7.4 Relaxation of marks in the qualifying examination

Kerala Scheduled Caste/Scheduled Tribe Category: The minimum requirement for admission to PG programmes is a pass in the qualifying examination for the Kerala Scheduled caste /Scheduled tribe category.

OEC Category: A relaxation of 5% marks in the qualifying examination from the prescribed minimum is allowed i.e. CGPA of 1.80 for CBCSS (2009), CCPA of 4.5 for CBCSS (2013) applicants and 45% marks for pre -CBCSS applicants for admission to MSc programmes and CGPA of 1.60 for CBCSS (2009), CCPA of 4.0 for CBCSS (2013) applicants and 40% marks for pre CBCSS applicants for admission to MA/MCom programmes.

SEBC Category: A relaxation of 3% marks in the qualifying examination from the prescribed minimum is allowed i.e. CGPA of 1.88 for CBCSS (2009), CCPA of 4.7 for CBCSS (2013), applicants and 47% marks for pre-CBCSS applicants for admission to M Sc programmes and CGPA of 1.68 for CBCSS (2009), CCPA of 4.2 for CBCSS (2013) applicants and 42% marks for pre-CBCSS applicants for admission to MA/MCom programmes.

Persons with Disability Category: A relaxation of 5% marks in the qualifying examination from the prescribed minimum is allowed for Physically Challenged candidates. CGPA of 1.80 for CBCSS applicants and 45% marks for revised CBCSS and pre - CBCSS applicants for admission to **MSc programmes**. CGPA of 1.60 for CBCSS applicants and 40% marks for revised CBCSS and pre - CBCSS applicants for admission to **MA/MCom programme**.

7. FEES

Candidates shall remit the fees as per University/Government rules at the time of admission.



Candidates belonging to SC/ST communities admitted against merit seats or against the seats reserved for them are exempted from payment of fee.

Candidates belonging to OEC admitted against merit seats or against the unavailed seats of SC/ST are exempted from payment of fee (as per GO.(MS) No.14/2005/SCSTDD dated 5.4.2005 & GO.(MS) No.36/07/SCSTDD dated 03.07.2007). Candidates belonging to OEC admitted to government seats through SEBC reservation are also exempted from payment of fee (as per GO.(MS) No. 50/2006/SCSTDD dated 22.09.2006).

Candidates belonging to OEC are exempted from payment of fee at the time of admission to PG Degree Programmes under Government/Community quota irrespective of annual family income as per GO (MS) No.36/07/SCSTDD dated 03.07.2007. They should provide Community Certificate from the Village Officer concerned.

8. ELIGIBILITY FOR ADMISSION & INDEX MARKS CALCULATION

Academic eligibility should be satisfied as on the last date of submission of academic data. No candidate shall be admitted to the PG programme unless he/she possesses qualification and minimum requirement thereof.

If an applicant for admission is found to have indulged in ragging in the past or if it is noticed later, admissions shall be denied or he/she shall be expelled from the college.

Candidates should have passed the corresponding degree examination under the 10 + 2 + 3 pattern with one core/main subject and two complementary/subsidiary subjects from any of the Universities in Kerala or of any other University recognized by Mahatma Gandhi University as equivalent thereto are eligible for admission, subject to the stipulation regarding marks.

OR

Candidates who have passed Degree examination with Double or Triple main or candidates who have passed the degree examination in Vocational or Specialized Programmes are also eligible for admission. However, they have to submit copy of the Equivalency/Eligibility Certificate from Mahatma Gandhi University, stating that, their Qualifying Examination is recognized for seeking admission to the corresponding PG programme(s) as applicable, at the time of admission. This provision is not applicable in the case of applicants who have passed their qualifying examination from Mahatma Gandhi University.

Graduates with English under Part III (Model I/II/III) and graduates in the other faculties of language and literature, social science, science, oriental studies are eligible for applying for MA programme in English provided they satisfy the eligibility criteria as detailed below. **75% of the total seats** will be reserved for those who have taken the subject as Optional (Main) concerned under Part III for the BA Degree course.

If the index marks of more candidates happen to be the same, then for breaking the ‘tie’, the following criteria shall be followed one after another in the order given below:

1. If more than one candidate obtaining equal index marks (including weightage/deduction), the candidate who has scored more marks in Part III Main will be placed higher in ranking.
2. If the tie persists the candidate who has scored more marks in Part I common courses/papers English will be placed higher in ranking
3. If the tie still persists, the marks scored in Part II common course/additional language will be considered.
4. If the tie still persists, the age of the candidates will be taken into account, the older being placed higher in the ranking.
5. Even after this exercise, if the tie persists, the alphabetical order of the first name of the candidates will be taken into account.

Rounding of marks of 0.5 and above to the highest figure shall not be done while calculating the percentage of marks for minimum eligibility.



9. PREPARATION OF RANK LIST

Under pre CBCSS pattern, the rank list of PG programmes will be prepared on the basis of the marks obtained in the qualifying examination in Part III subjects unless otherwise mentioned, standardized to 1000. The index mark is arrived at after adding/deducting weightage/bonus marks/negative marks, if any.

Under CBCSS and revised CBCSS pattern, the CGPA secured for Part III Core group (Core + Complementary courses) unless otherwise mentioned shall be converted into marks out of 1000. The index mark is arrived at after adding /deducting weightage/bonus marks/negative marks, if any.

9.1 Bonus marks

The Bonus marks will be awarded as follows:

Bonus mark of 10 shall be awarded to 'B' and 'C' Certificate holders in proof of their high proficiency. For NCC candidates the bonus marks will be awarded on the basis of the NCC certificates signed by the Director and issued by the Directorate provided the candidates have secured at least 75% attendance after having participated in NCC activities during the period of study for Undergraduate programmes. The Claim of these candidates who have participated in NCC/NSS activities prior to the University level programme i.e. Higher Secondary / Plus Two / Vocational Higher Secondary etc will not be taken into account for awarding bonus marks.

Bonus of five marks will be awarded to NSS candidates for admission to all programmes. The bonus marks will be awarded on the basis of NSS certificates signed by the Vice-Chancellor or the Pro-Vice-Chancellor and issued to volunteers who have completed 240 hours of work within a period of 2 years of undergraduate study immediately preceding the PG programmes for which admission sought.

The benefit of bonus marks can be scored either for NSS or NCC only

Bonus of 15 marks will be awarded to the Ex-servicemen applicants and widows and children of Jawans and Ex-service men seeking admission to all Programmes. Applicants in this category should invariably produce the certificate in support of their claim at the time of admission. The certificate should be obtained not earlier than six months from the last date of submission of application from the military authorities or state/Zila Sainik Welfare Officer to the effect that the applicant is the son/daughter of ex-service man or an ex-service man himself/herself. The certificate should clearly show that the benefit of reservation has not been granted earlier to any member in the family. In the absence of the above certificate the claim will not be considered.

Bonus marks will be added only if the candidate has obtained the prescribed minimum qualifying marks in the qualifying examination while calculating the index marks.

9.2 Negative marks

Deduction will be made from the total ranking marks for those candidates who had availed more than one chance in passing the qualifying examination. ***Five marks will be deducted*** from the total



rank marks for each additional appearance he/she has taken for completing the qualifying examination. Number of chances means the number of chances for passing any part of the qualifying examination excluding cancellation.

Wherever letter grades are given for the qualifying examination, the candidate should produce the relevant document so that the grades can be converted into actual marks. In the case of grades where marks range is given, the mid value will be taken for computation of index marks.

10. HOW TO REGISTER

All the applicants, irrespective of various quotas shall register online for applying to the PG Degree Programmes. A candidate can apply for three programmes.

Registration Fee

All candidates except SC/ST: ₹400/-

SC/ST/OEC candidates: ₹200/-

Management quota: ₹100/-

Registration fee once remitted will not be refunded under any circumstance

Before starting Online Application Registration, ensure that a recent passport size colour photograph (light coloured background) [35mm × 45mm (width × height)] in jpg format which is less than 100kb size is kept ready for uploading to the website.

10.1 Steps for Online Registration

2. Start registration using the Admission PG Admission 2025 link.
3. Read the instructions carefully and then click “Register” button
4. Fields marked with * are mandatory
5. Enter the details and click on “Register Student” button
6. Login to the admission portal with the username and password obtained during registration
7. Choose the programme “PG Application”
8. Click on the button “Application for Admission to PG Programme”
9. Choose the Programme according to student preference, with most preferred
10. option being “Program Preference 1”
11. Select Online Fee Payment method and click on “Make Payment” button
12. After getting the payment successful message click on “Proceed” button
13. Enter the personal details and click on “Submit” button
14. Enter the qualification and weightage details in the ‘Educational Details’ tab and click on “Submit” button
15. Upload necessary certificates and click on “Final Submit” button
16. The applicant will be taken to “My Applications” page, where he/she can view the submitted application.

10.2 Sports quota, Cultural Quota and Physically Challenged Applicants

Candidates claiming reservation under sports quota, cultural quota and persons with disability



category shall check the respective fields at the time of registration. They shall upload the supporting documents while registering.

10.3 Management Quota Applicants

Candidates who wish to be considered in the management quota (MQ) shall register online and shall check the corresponding field at the time of registration. Application fee for management quota is ₹100/-. The form can be printed from the website after final submission. The form, duly signed by the parish priest (for catholic students) and candidate along with supporting documents shall be submitted in the office of the Manager/Principal on or before the last date of online registration.

Erroneous data, other than specified, can be edited till the closing date of registration.**

11. ADMISSION PROCESS

11.1 Admission of Candidates Coming under Physically Challenged and Special Reservation Categories

The rank list of the candidates will be published in the website. Selected candidates will be informed through SMS and e - mail. Those who are selected shall print the application form from the website. He/She can complete the admission process on the dates mentioned in the admission schedule.

11.2 Publication of Rank List (General Merit, SC/ST & Community Merit) and Admission

The rank list of the candidates in the open merit, SC/ST and community merit will be published in the website. Selected candidates will be informed through SMS and e - mail. Those who are selected shall print the application form from the website. He/She can complete the admission process on the dates mentioned in the admission schedule.

11.3 Reporting at the College for Admission

The selected candidates (general merit) shall report for admission in the respective departments in the dates mentioned in the admission schedule.

The admission fee shall be remitted via online mode.

The candidates shall produce the following documents at the time of admission.

1. Print out of the signed application form
2. College copy of challan
3. Certificate to prove date of birth
4. Copy shall be submitted along with the application form
5. Transfer Certificate (TC) from the institution last attended
6. Course and Conduct Certificate from the institution last attended
7. Mark lists of all parts of the degree examination.



8. Eligibility Certificate from Mahatma Gandhi University, in the case of candidates who have passed their qualifying examination from other Universities
9. Migration certificate, if applicable
10. Aadhaar card
11. Caste certificate in the case of SC/ST candidates
12. Community Certificate along with Income certificate from the revenue authorities concerned
13. The income certificate should not have been issued earlier than 12 months prior to the submission of application
14. Candidates who wish to avail of bonus/weightage marks shall produce the relevant certificates
15. Copy of certificates in proof of bonus/weightage marks shall be submitted along with the application form

11.4 Verification of Documents

The Head of the Department shall be responsible for verification of original documents and checking the correctness of the data. The Head of the Institution will have the right to deny an admission, if he finds any relevant mismatch in the original documents and the submitted data that has affected the ranking process.

If a candidate was denied admission due to incorrect entry of marks or claim for bonus marks, he/she shall register again in the dates announced by the college, for being considered in the supplementary admission.

11.5 Candidates Retaining Higher Preference

Candidates securing admission to a programme can retain their higher preference till the initiation of supplementary admission procedure and such candidates shall redo the admission process for supplementary admission.

11.6 Failure to Report for Admission

Candidates who do not take admission on the prescribed date and time in the college will lose his/her claim for admission. Claim by candidates who fail to report in the college before the stipulated time will not be entertained.

Anyone who secures admission on the basis of erroneous or false information will forfeit his/her admission and be dismissed from the College as soon as the matter is noticed by the authorities.

Students are advised to keep enough number of attested copies of the certificates and mark lists before submitting them in the college at the time of admission.

**12. SUPPLEMENTARY ADMISSION**

Any unfilled seats after SC/ST special admissions will be advertised. Those who have not registered, denied admission due to incorrect entry of marks or claim for bonus marks etc. can register online on the stipulated dates. They shall submit the printout of the application form in the College office. Those who have already registered and not admitted to any programme need not register again but shall submit the printout of the application form in the College office. Selected candidates will be informed through SMS and e - mail. Those who are selected shall complete the admission process on the dates mentioned in the admission schedule.

13. SPOT ADMISSION

Those seats which remain vacant in any programme after supplementary admission will be filled by spot admission. The dates for spot admission if any will be intimated in the college website. Admission will be made on the stipulated dates based on merit.

14. STUDENT ACCOMMODATION

The college provides ample hostel facilities for boys and girls. The admission to hostels is on a first come first served basis. Hostel admission forms may be collected from the respective hostels. The filled forms shall be given to the hostel authorities directly.
